

NACHO ORANGES AND BELAM FRUITS

Orange cultivation is the one of the primary sources of income in Nacho, providing livelihoods and sustains local communities.

Oranges ripen during the months of November and December, creating a picturesque landscape. This seasonal spectacle offers an aesthetically delightful visual experience that compliments the natural splendour of the hills. Discerning travellers have an opportunity to engage in orchard tours and fruit picking and enjoy freshly picked oranges. Tourism service providers can curate niche programs for visitors to partake in learning of the region's agricultural practices.









BELAM FRUITS

Locally know as 'Belam' fruit Sterculia coccinea is a wild fruit indigenous to the hills of Nacho. Its Assamese name is Naak sepeta. They ripen during the months of April and May, and are known for its distinctive flavour and nutritional properties. Its limited availability and unique taste make it a much sought-after delicacy residents. report published among Α PlantJournal.com cites a 2019 study that concluded that extracts from the fruit can be used for developing traditional medicines.



NACHO'S BIRDS

POKDUR BIRDS



The beautiful Pokdur bird otherwise known as Taiwan Barbet is a multi-coloured bird predominantly in green. A dash of red on the lore, blue ear-coverts and mustard yellow throat. Bands of blue, red, grey and black beak complete what is known as a cornucopia of colours! Sighting this gorgeous bird in its natural habitat along the hills of the eastern Himalayas is certain to be sought after experience.

PVRWK BIRDS

The Khalij Pheasant, known locally as the Pvrwk bird inhabits the forests surrounding Nacho. Male birds display a partially glossy blu-black plumage, but can appear in different hues depending on their subspecies. Females however are normally seen in a brown tinge. Both males and females feature a distinctive bare red face and greyish legs. These birds are charming and are a reward for time spent in nature.





TAKSING'S YAKS

In the Subansari river valley Taksing village is home to Yaks that flourish in the pristine rural himalayan landscape. Found throughout the region, they play an indispensable role in the daily lives of villagers, reliable serving as a transportation means across difficult terrains and help in supplying essential resources milk, like meat, and wool. Enduring the harsh cold weather patterns of the region and navigating tough terrains,



they show forth their resilience, and highlight the value they bring to the local economy. That apart, the Yaks are also a testimony to the community's cultural and economic fabric. Similarly to the Gltagged Yak Churpi from West Kameng and Tawang districts, Yak milk is utilized in crafting a variety of food items.

HANGPAN DADA MEMORIAL TROPHY

The 7th edition of the Hangpan Dada Memorial Trophy tournament under 16 showcased thrilling football and volleyball competitions for boys and girls at both the Constitutional and District levels in Upper Subansiri District, Arunachal Pradesh.
